FLAG DAY

Did you remember that June 14 is celebrated as Flag Day in the U.S.? Please display your flag proudly on this day.

Did you know that the idea of an annual day just for celebrating the flag was begun in 1885 by BJ Cigrand, a schoolteacher in Wisconsin? Over the next three decades, other teachers planned ceremonies for their students. Then the idea caught on by several organizations until, finally, inspired by these local celebrations, Flag Day – the anniversary of the Flag Revolution of 1777- was officially established by the Proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson on May 30, 1916. It was not, however, until August 3, 1949, that President Harry Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14 of each year as National Flag Day.

AVAILABLE SERVICES

- 1. Free Phone if eligible Safelink Wireless is a provider of the Government's Lifeline Support Program. The program limits Life Line Support System to one per household. You may participate if you participating in such programs as Food Stamps (SNAP), Fuel Assistance, Medicaid. You could qualify for up to 350 minutes per month at no charge. Contact the Safe Link Wireless information line at 1-800-723-3546) Monday – Saturday 8a.m.-10p.m. and Sunday 8a.m. to 7p.m. Eastern Standard time.
- 2. IT IS ALMOST SUMMER and the heat will be upon us before we know it. Please follow all the safety rules to ensure you remain well during this vacation season. Wear a hat, wear sufficient sun screen, drink plenty of water, and don't stay out in the sun too long in high heat. During heat waves, please check on your neighbors for their well-being. When an official heat wave may be announced, be aware that the **Senior Center will remain** open later as a cooling station if needed.
- 3. **EMPTY PILL BOTTLES?** The Lion's Club of Rutland is collecting empty prescription

bottles. These pill bottles will be sent to Malawi in Africa where prescription bottles are greatly needed. We have a collection box at the Sr. Center where you may drop off your empties.

4. **OUTDATED MEDICATION**?

There is a lock box at the Police Station where you can drop off left over pills, outdated pills or meds no longer needed. They discarded will be properly. When there is an officer present, just knock on the door and the officer will place the pills in the lock box. If an officer is not available, you may call the police non-emergency number at the Rutland dispatch and ask them to let an officer know that you have medication to be collected or you can contact the Sr. Center.

OAKHAM HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION

On Wednesday, June 14, 2017 the OHA will host a presentation by clock historian and appraiser Robert Cheney of Skinner, Inc. He will trace the trade of handcrafting mechanical clocks in the early 18th century to the birth Connecticut clock making industry Overcoming poor about 1825. training, war, and trade embargos,

which caused a total lock of suitable raw materials, the New England clockmaker overcame these difficulties and produced the most complicated object in the 18th century home. Mr. Cheney is a 3rd generation clockmaker and currently **Director** of clocks, Watches, and Scientific Instruments at Skinner, Inc. He has made TVnumerous appearances including the **PBS Antiques** Roadshow and is the author of numerous articles and reviews. The talk will be held at the Oakham Historical Museum, 1221 Turnpike Rd.
