WORCESTER REVOLUTION OF 1774:

In the August "Herald" we talked about the story behind the 1774 March for Independence in Worcester and how the Oakham Historical Association planned to commemorate this event by walking the 16.5 to Worcester as a re-enactment of the original march on August 9, 2014.

It was a beautiful day for such a walk. The participants gathered at the Oakham Common and started off with flute music of the era by Marcia Dwelly's granddaughter, Jessica, and led by a mounted horsewoman, Colleen Corice. Of the 30 that started the walk, 25

completed the march. Three of these walkers. we are proud to sav. represented our senior population well: Bob Benoit, Lee Dougan, coordinator or event. and Malcolm the Ide. Congratulations to each of you. Well Done!!

As the final event to this historical moment in our history, a celebration of the 1774 Worcester Revolution will be held on Sunday, September 7, 2014 from 10a.m. until 5p.m. at the Institute Park area, Worcester, MA.

In September 1774 thousands of Central Mass militiamen put an end to British rule in rural Mass. Two years before the signing of the Declaration of Independence, the men and women of Worcester County fought and won their own revolution – without firing a shot.

SURPRISING THINGS THAT ARE CONTAGIOUS: cont'd from August Herald:

Happiness and other positive feelings rub off onto others. When you feel happy, a friend who lives within one mile is 25% more likely to feel happy and neighbors are 34% more likely to feel happy. Data show that an extra \$5,000 increased happiness by about 2%, a much lower impact than what's gained by having a joyful friend of a friend which can boost your own good feelings by 10%.
